The Gospel Readings for the Sundays in August

August 2nd - Trinity 8

Bible Reading: Matthew 14.13-21

Now when Jesus heard this, he withdrew from there in a boat to a deserted place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, 'This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves.' Jesus said to them, 'They need not go away; you give them something to eat.' They replied, 'We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish.' And he said, 'Bring them here to me.' Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.

Pause for Thought

In Matthew's telling of this gospel story a hungry crowd of 5000+ is fed with the five loaves and two fish. For a little more detail on the source of those five loaves and two fish read John's gospel which tells us they were the contents of a young boy's packed lunch box! To cut a longer story short this young boy's small offering, handed over to Jesus, was all that was needed to start to address a much bigger problem. Perhaps you like me have sometimes felt powerless in the face of this pandemic or other problems and disasters you have faced? Wondering what to do to help others and how in fact to help. I take both challenge and assurance from today's gospel story. The challenge: to be alert to need and offer what I have. Assurance: the assurance being that when things get handed over to Jesus it's as if the impossible seems to become possible, and that Jesus can do amazing things with our small, simple and practical offerings.

Prayer

Lord God, your Son left the riches of heaven and became poor for our sake: when we prosper save us from pride, when we are needy save us from despair, that we may trust in you alone; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

August 9th - Trinity 9

Bible Reading: Matthew 14.22-33

Immediately he made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. And early in the morning he came walking towards them on the lake. But when the disciples saw him walking on the lake, they were terrified, saying, 'It is a ghost!' And they cried out in fear. But immediately Jesus spoke to them and said, 'Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid.' Peter answered him, 'Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water.' He said, 'Come.' So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came towards Jesus. But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, 'Lord, save me!' Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, 'You of little faith, why did you doubt?' When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. And those in the boat worshipped him, saying, 'Truly you are the Son of God.'

Pause for Thought

The gospel books contain many stories about Peter at different points along the way as indeed does the book of Acts. I think we probably know more about him than any other of the disciples. We see and hear him promising to stand by Jesus to the very end and we see him floundering too. In today's gospel story Peter is up for walking on water to come and meet Jesus only to find himself distracted and frightened by the wind, the waves and the fear of going under. There may be times in our lives when the metaphorical wind and the waves threaten to overwhelm us. Peter learnt three very important words as he floundered and struggled, 'Lord, save me.' We too can say and pray these words to the one who listens and will respond in love and grace and power.

Prayer

Almighty God, who sent your Holy Spirit to be the life and light of your Church: open our hearts to the riches of your grace, that we may bring forth the fruit of the Spirit in love and joy and peace; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

August 16th - Trinity 10

Bible Reading: Matthew 15.21-28

Jesus left that place and went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, 'Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon.' But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, 'Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us.' He answered, 'I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel.' But she came and knelt before him, saying, 'Lord, help me.' He answered, 'It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs.' She said, 'Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their masters' table.' Then Jesus answered her, 'Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish.' And her daughter was healed instantly.

Pause for Thought

I wonder what we make of this story? I wonder whose side we are on? My sympathies lie with the woman whose child is desperately ill and I find myself getting angry at the thought that her being a gentile and a foreigner might mean she could be shooed away by the disciples and overlooked by Jesus. Thankfully not the case - the woman is heard by Jesus, praised for her faith and her daughter is made well. Who because of our attitudes and structures in society today (and even in our communities) gets overlooked? What are we going to do about it?

Prayer

Lord of heaven and earth, as Jesus taught his disciples to be persistent in prayer, give us patience and courage never to lose hope, but always to bring our prayers before you; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

August 23rd - Trinity 11

Bible Reading: Matthew 16.13-20

Now when Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that the Son of Man is?' And they said, 'Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' He said to them, 'But who do you say that I am?' Simon Peter answered, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.' And Jesus answered him, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven.' Then he sternly ordered the disciples not to tell anyone that he was the Messiah.

Pause for Thought

Almost everyone who came into contact with Jesus realised that there was something special about him - even if they didn't like him or respect him for it. Peter has spent a lot of time in the company of Jesus and, I think it's fair to say, he was beginning to see things from God's point of view, and coming to recognise Jesus not just as a good man, or an inspirational person to be around, but to believe him to be the Messiah and indeed the Son of the Living God. It was a transformative moment for Peter and changed the course of his life. If Jesus was to say to you today, 'Who do you say that I am?' I wonder what you would say?

Prayer

God of glory, the end of our searching, help us to lay aside all that prevents us from seeking your kingdom, and to give all that we have to gain the pearl beyond all price, through our Saviour Jesus

August 30th - Trinity 12

Bible Reading: Matthew 16.21-end

From that time on, Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and undergo great suffering at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him, saying, 'God forbid it, Lord! This must never happen to you.' But he turned and said to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling-block to me; for you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.' Then Jesus told his disciples, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it. For what will it profit them if they gain the whole world but forfeit their life? Or what will they give in return for their life? 'For the Son of Man is to come with his angels in the glory of his Father, and then he will repay everyone for what has been done. Truly I tell you, there are some standing here who will not taste death before they see the Son of Man coming in his kingdom.'

Pause for Thought

A week on in our reading of Matthew's gospel and Peter the rock is more like sand, or as Jesus puts it a stumbling block, even Satan himself. For poor old Peter it feels like two steps forward one step back or even worse. And perhaps it's the same with us? One minute we're feeling great and ready to take on the world, whereas the next ... ?! Like Peter we can be both rock and sand. Don't worry. All we need to do is acknowledge our weakness and need, offer it to God, and take things from there.

Prayer

God of constant mercy, who sent your Son to save us: remind us of your goodness, increase your grace within us, that our thankfulness may grow, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

Old Hutton & Holmescales Parish Council

Owing to the Covid-19 lockdown, Old Hutton & Holmescales Parish Council held three meetings in June on Zoom.

At the Annual Open Meeting, John Heap agreed to continue as Chairman of the Parish Council. A parishioner, on behalf of the community, thanked the Parish Council for all the work it does.

At the following AGM of the Council the Chairman's report for 2019/20 was:

Given the current difficulties arising from the covid-19 pandemic this report will be fairly short. There are only two matters on which I propose to comment:

- *Parking problems on the road through the village during school times – we are still awaiting the proposals of CCC Highways. When we return to more normal times, I will contact the relevant person to obtain a time frame for the receipt of that report and proposals.*
- *The BARN project has been successfully completed. It is noted that in our parish there is one remaining property which requires the service – this will be completed when the current situation permits.*

The AGM was mainly concerned with administrative matters, one of which was that John Heap agreed to continue as the Parish Council representative to the Armistead Wind Farm Funding Committee.

The third meeting was an ordinary meeting with a brief agenda mainly covering urgent issues. The annual survey of all roads in Old Hutton & Holmescales has been completed and a map of the problems has been sent to CCC Highways. The Parish Council congratulated Alison Nicholson on her award of Queen's Nurse status and thanked her for all her work supporting elderly frail patients in the community.

Financial matters to do with last year's accounts were dealt with and these can be seen on the parish website. The dates of the period for the exercise of public rights are Monday 15th June to Friday 24th July. The Community Account balance on the 1st April 2020 was £2811.83. It is now £4863.34 after the receipt of the parish precept. A maximum of £111.53 has been authorised to be spent in the broadband project. The balance of the Business Account remains at £641.78.

Owing to the lockdown, no progress has yet been made on the CCC Working Together Scheme which, it is hoped, will maintain the listed boundary stones and milestones in the parish. It was decided to invite the CCC officer in charge of the scheme in this area to talk at a future physical Parish Council meeting.

Also, no progress has been made with the issue of parking at the school. Two residents have sent the clerk photos and videos of traffic problems near the school. These can be used as evidence in the future if needed.

It was agreed that the date of the next meeting will be decided when there is sufficient urgent business, depending on the progress of the Covid-19 lockdown. A date in August was suggested.
